CELEBRATION CAMES, GRIT, AND GROUNDBREAKING IDEAS CSU TAKES FLIGHT IN 47TH ANNIV FESTIVITIES

PARRI, CAGAYAN — Beneath the early morning sun of June 10th, a stream of university officials, alumni, faculty, and staff gathered at Cagayan State University (CSU) – Aparri Campus, all uniting for a day steeped in tradition, innovation, and the spirit of community in the 47th Founding Anniversary Fellowship Activities.

Get the ball rolling

The opening program, hosted by Mr. Jerome Billariña, brought together university officials including Dr. Theresa Dimalanta, Dr. Kristinne Joyce Lara, and Dr. Chita Ramos, who laid the groundwork for the day's celebration with messages of unity and progress.

"Today, we gather not just to commemorate a date in history but to celebrate a legacy built on dedication, perseverance, and the collective dreams of those who have walked our halls—past and present, " said Dr. Theresa Dimalanta, Vice President for Administration and Finance, as she nurtured the CSUan spirit with her opening remarks.

Founding Anniversary

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The University Information Office further intensified the energy with video highlights, showcasing the motorcade, the opening program, and various simultaneous activities, including the much-anticipated Sarabo Achievement Hub.

Bringing home the bacon

Throughout the day, activities at the Dummy Bridge brought flavors and friendly competition to life, where dishes weren't just shared but celebrated. In the Culinary Innovation Showcase, chefs were required to prominently feature ingredients primarily sourced from their respective campuses, while adding a unique twist to traditional recipes.

Meanwhile, the Tinuno Festival highlighted community dining, where common seafoods were grilled over charcoal and served on banana leaves, creating a hearty feast that echoed local customs.

"We expect that we will be able to produce this in each campus, like for students, for our employees. That it can be duplicated, it can be served—ibig sabihin, ito ay pang-masa, " shared CSU Hotel Administrator Prof. Judy B. Luyun, reflecting on the innovations showcased through the event's dishes.

Big fish in a small pond

The first activity, the Hook and Harvest Tournament, was held at ponds six and seven, stirring good-natured rivalries and spontaneous laughter as teams competed in fishing challenges that echoed the values of sustainability and collaboration.

During the tournament, participants demonstrated two traditional fishing methods—banniit (n. fishing tackle) and kammel (meaning to catch fish with the hands).

www.ith pride in its past and vision for the future, Cagayan State University (CSU) commemorated its 47th year of transformative service through a vibrant, week-long celebration hosted by the CSU – Aparri Campus, June 2 – 11, 2025.

Guided by its mission of providing quality education that responds to individual and societal needs, CSU continues to strengthen its commitment to innovation, relevance, and service to the region and beyond. For fortyseven years, CSU has upheld its philosophy of delivering accessible and communityresponsive programs across its growing network of campuses.

The anniversary celebration, which carried the theme "Soaring High: Celebrating 47 Years of Excellence and Transformation at Cagayan State University," kicked off with a vibrant opening salvo and the much-anticipated SARABO 2025 Trade Fair, all under the unifying spirit of CSU's signature amethyst hue.

CSU Aparri's Warm Welcome



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Dressed in colorful costumes and bursting with energy, 3,039 CSU students of Aparri Campus welcomed university officials, campus executive officers, faculty, staff, and guests during the grand walk, captivating the crowd with lively and wellchoreographed welcome dance numbers. Dr. Audy R. Quebral, CEO of CSU Aparri Campus, officially welcomed the delegates, expressing immense gratitude and pride in hosting this historic celebration. In his message, he acknowledged the honor of bringing together CSU's academic community in the spirit of collaboration and shared purpose.

The opening program featured a comprehensive overview of the anniversary events from Dr. Ana Marie Cristina C. Cauilan, Vice President for Internationalization, Partnerships, and Resource Mobilization (VPIPRM). "This year, we're inspired by the majestic hawk in amethyst ombre color, a perfect symbol for our host campus. Let us join the Aparri hawk soar with strength and grace as we all continue our legacy in flight," she said.

Dr. Mariden V. Cauilan, Vice President for Academic Affairs (VPAA), presented the details of the Regional Faculty Convocation while Dr. Junel B. Guzman, Vice President for Research, Development, and Extension (VPRDE), introduced the SARABO Trade Fair and Technology Demo Booths.

The President's Report

The President's Report, delivered by University President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez through an audio-visual presentation, highlighting Cagayan State University's key accomplishments from February 2024 to present and its strategic alignment with the Eight-Point Socioeconomic Agenda, Ambisyon Natin 2040, the Cagayan Valley Development Plan 2023–2028, and the Sustainable Development Goals.

In instruction, CSU achieved an 84.06% board exam passing rate, well above the national average, and produced 50 national topnotchers in various fields.

The university was recognized as the Top 1 Performing School in Respiratory Therapy, Top 3 in Medical Technology, Top 4 in Electrical Engineering, Top 6 in Chemical Engineering, and Top 8 in Criminology.

The number of graduates rose to 7,202 in 2024, and CSU ranked Top 1 among SUCs with the most Level IV accredited programs. All campuses are ISO-certified, and CHED compliance reached 93.57%. It also achieved Level III Institutional Accreditation during the first cycle visit by AACCUP.

In administration, CSU posted high budget utilization rates, secured a ₱1.38B budget for 2025, and generated ₱35.9M from income-generating projects. It expanded with its 10th campus in Baggao and created new faculty positions.

In research, and development, CSU launched the Bioanalytical Nexus Center and the Food Quality and Safety Lab, securing P196.7 million in external research funds. Two boardapproved journals were launched. A total of 113 faculty had patents or publications; 539 research outputs were cited.

In extension, CSU conducted 161 training sessions for 11,621 beneficiaries and established 28 community partnerships.

In pursuit of internationalization, CSU launched the Athena Roadmap, a 2024–2027 plan aligned with CHED's IZN framework for higher education.

It mobilized over 1,400 students and faculty, with forged global partnerships, and launched initiatives like the Filipino Coffee Institute-CSU in partnership with the Filipino Coffee Institute. Among its landmark achievements, CSU received official approval from the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) for multiple international partnerships.

Continuing the Legacy

These achievements are but a glimpse of CSU's unwavering pursuit of academic and operational excellence. For forty-seven years, CSU has led with purpose. Shaping minds, serving communities, and transforming futures. We are one CSU community, united by a shared mission and driven by a legacy of excellence. Ás we soar toward the future, let us remain steadfast in our role as champions of transformative education for the future we envision and the generations we inspire. 🐯



CSU UNVEILS FIVE INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS IN CELEBRATION OF 47TH FOUNDING ANNIVERSARY

s part of its 47th Founding Anniversary celebration, Cagayan State University (CSU) launched five major infrastructure projects across its campuses, reinforcing its commitment to academic development, community engagement, and sustainable growth.

Three key projects were officially inaugurated during the kick-off ceremony on June 2, 2025, through a ceremonial ribbon-cutting led by university officials. These include the Executive Villa, the campus road network, and the Balai ti Alumni.

The Executive Villa was introduced as a modern accommodation facility for visiting university officials. Designed as a prototype for future hostel-style campus housing, the villa also presents potential for income generation through university-managed lodging services.

The university also unveiled a 200-meter campus road network that connects the campus to Apagonan Road, significantly enhancing accessibility and mobility. This development supports CSU's Land Use Development and Infrastructure Plan (LUDIP) and contributes to long-term campus planning and land use optimization.

To strengthen alumni engagement, CSU opened the Balai ti Alumni, a dedicated space for alumni services, career placement programs, and institutional networking. The facility aims to serve as a hub for reconnecting alumni with university initiatives and fostering long-term partnerships.

On June 10, 2025, OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez, alongside CSU vice presidents, campus executive officers, and university officials, led the ribboncutting and groundbreaking ceremonies for two additional infrastructure projects at CSU Aparri: the Fish Production and Management Office and the Upgrading of the Aramang Processing Facility.

The Fish Production and Management Office is designed to enhance aquaculture-related research and instruction. It will support CSU's agri-fishery programs by focusing on sustainable practices, fisheries management, and food security, while also aiding local economic development.

Meanwhile, the Upgrading of the Aramang Processing Facility, a Php5,000,000.00 project funded by the Department of Agriculture– Bureau of Agricultural Research (DA-BAR), aims to increase the facility's production capacity by 75%. The expansion includes additional equipment and workspace, directly benefiting students, researchers, and local fisherfolk. ♥





BEYOND THE BOOTHS: CSU'S BRANCHES OF INNOVATIVE BREAKTHROUGHS

he Sarabo Achievement Hub unfurls its lush branches across the nine vibrant campuses of Cagayan State University (CSU), like a majestic tree rooted deep in the fertile soil of knowledge and aspiration.

Each branch brims with luscious fruits—testaments to the collective labor, diverse Research, Development & Extension (RDE), and an unwavering flame of innovation of the various campuses. Under the golden sun of progress, these branches sway, whispering tales of dedication and growth, their leaves rustling with the promise of a flourishing future.

The Hoot Spot – CSU Andrews

Perched quietly but confidently among the vibrant offerings of this year's showcase is The Hoot Spot, the health-focused booth of CSU Andrews Campus. Inspired by the night owl, a symbol of vigilance and wisdom, the booth embodies the campus's identity of "watching over your health."

Their product lineup is a thoughtful fusion of nutrition, wellness, and creativity. Those who stop by are treated to spinach cookies, squash donuts, sweet potato bread, beef tapa, and lettuce chips, each one not just delicious, but designed with health and research in mind. Even their antibacterial skincare products and storybook souvenirs reflect the same principle: nourishing both body and mind.

As one of the quietly compelling fruits of this year's innovation tree, The Hoot Spot stands out for its balance of science and soul. The space feels more like a comforting corner than a commercial display, an invitation to slow down, taste something good, and reflect on how health can be nurtured in everyday choices. Through each item crafted with purpose, CSU Andrews proves that to care for others is also to educate, to nourish, and to create.

Aquamart – CSU Aparri

Where the river meets the sea, the Aquamart of CSU Aparri shall be busy. Through its niche products, freshwater and seafood products, the CSU Aparri's product roster thrives with the fisherfolk.

They offer a wide array of fresh seafood such as lobsters, padaw, vannamei, crabs, blue marlin, and malaga. It also showcases dried fish varieties including aramang, bursawit, sweet pusit, espada, and dilis, among others. For those who prefer ready-to-eat delights, their packaged products include Aramang Chili Garlic Oil, Aramang Chicken Pastil, Sweet and Spicy Dilis, Smoked Bangus, Tapang Bangus, and Fish Lumpia.

Beyond its vibrant product lineup, CSU Aparri is also breaking new ground in research and product development. Among the innovative seafood-based creations in progress are alamang crinkles and alamang takoyaki.

The production of some of these products are in partnership with adopted barangays, Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP), and Padaya Women's Association. This shall ensure that the seaside is brought to your taste buds in just a single purchase.

Just as the sea waves surge the shore, the Aquamart aspires to plunge its impact to the communities that surround it. "Our adopted barangay is like a family to us, and everything we do is influenced by their needs and preferences. Therefore, from cross-harvesting to labeling and packaging, all our products are meticulously researched and tailored to their specific requirements." Ms. Diana Grace Licopit, a professor at CSU Aparri, shared her insights into the heart and soul behind their extension projects and the products they sell.



Eagle's Nest – CSU Carig

Tuguegarao City, the major urban center of Cagayan, is home to CSU Carig Eagle's Nest, a hub where culture and innovation intertwine.

At the heart of it lies CSU Carig's Electromobility Research and Development Center (EMRDC), it is a testament to their commitment to environmental conservation and accessibility.

They have developed four innovative vehicles that cater to various needs: the E-buggy, designed for agriculture and rugged terrains; the E-trike and C-trike, converted from gas-fed engines to electric, which are already in use in Tuguegarao for emergencies; and the E-bus, currently in its development phase. Engr. Niel Israel shared that the initial cost of ₱2.50 per kilometer was reduced to ₱0.88 per kilometer when their vehicles were converted to electric.

Beyond engineering, the Eagle's Nest takes pride in its range of utilities to their community. They offer printing services within the campus, including souvenir items and services that are typically sought outside the campus, such as ID photos, tote bags, thesis bindings, ballpens, tokens, emblems, personalized notebooks, graduation photos, and more.

Furthermore, they have their own packaged products, including Fried Okra, Chichamatis, Turmeric Powder, and Ready to Drink Products.

The eagle's nest also extends its handwoven products, which are crafted by their partners from the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP), who are Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDL), it embodies the campus's broader mission creating meaningful change through inclusive, grounded development.

Balai Tangkiran – CSU Gonzaga

In a sea of booths bursting with color and enterprise, Balai Tangkiran of CSU Gonzaga stood as tall as the towering bamboo sticks not only in form, but in spirit. Rooted in the Ilocano word "tangkiran," meaning resilient, the booth was more than an exhibit; it was a livedin message.

Styled as a humble bamboo home complete with a sala, kitchen, and dining area, it was CSU Gonzaga's quiet yet compelling tribute to sustainable innovation. From the intricately engineered bamboo furniture to handcrafted mugs, plaques, and banana plantlets, every corner of the booth echoed the university's commitment to research, rural identity, and grounded creativity.

But this ingenuity did not just stop at structure. Their table was lined with research-based local products that felt both familiar yet new: nipakuratsa, bamboo cookies, chichacorn, chili oil, condiments, and soil enhancers, all crafted with purpose and pride in the indigenous resources found in their land.

The fact that these were all handmade by students and faculty, driven by community need and local knowledge, made the experience richer. Balai Tangkiran did not just showcase what CSU Gonzaga can do—it invited visitors to imagine what sustainable rural futures could look like when culture, science, innovation and hearts work together.

Balai Nego-show – CSU Lal-lo

With the comforting aroma of freshly brewed coffee wafting through the air, Balai Nego-Show, the booth of CSU Lal-lo, offers visitors a taste of heritage. Their niche centers on Valena Heritage coffee beans, a local treasure elevated through research into a rich, proudly rooted product. From raw beans to carefully processed brews, every cup tells a story of soil, history, and academic rigor.

As part of the larger showcase of campus-grown innovation, CSU Lal-lo stands out for bringing warmth and depth into each sip—proof that even the most familiar flavors can be reimagined with care and science.

While its products reflect creativity, Balai Nego-Show draws its soul from its thoughtful and purposeful design. The booth itself is modular and collapsible, a conscious choice meant to symbolize unity and collective movement.

"Kapag gagalaw ang isa, gagalaw ang lahat," Mr. Lyle Gavien Alcomendras, CSU Lal-lo's Science Research Assistant, shared; capturing the spirit of collaboration that extends from their student entrepreneurs to the communities they serve.

Balai Nego-Show is a mobile home of enterprise—designed to adapt, respond, and grow wherever it takes root.

Sparrow's Nest – CSU Lasam

Like a fruit ripened under the nurturing branches of SARABO, the CSU Lasam Campus brings forth a booth that's as warm and comforting as a cup of native chocolate, the Sparrow's Nest.

At its core is cacao—Lasam's proud niche, transformed through intensive research into a variety of delectable products. From rich, locally processed cacao tableya to smooth, comforting chocolate drinks and handcrafted cacao candies, every item is a result of campus-led studies that explore flavor, sustainability, and quality. These offerings go beyond tradition-they are proof of how science and agri-innovation can elevate local ingredients into refined, market-ready creations.

The hands-on exhibit also reflects Lasam's deep investment in food science and technology, highlighting Lasam's identity as a place "where tradition meets tech." Like a carefully built nest, their booth is both grounded and forward-looking—each product a feather woven from knowledge, culture, and pride.

Ytawes Fresh – CSU Piat

True to its name, Ytawes Fresh, the booth of CSU Piat Campus, brings a refreshing charm to the annual showcase. Nestled like a ripe fruit on the SARABO, this booth offers a full experience where every detail contributes to a rich and welcoming atmosphere.

With its cozy, farm-inspired setup, complete with natural tones and warm, inviting textures, the space evokes the feeling of being welcomed into a countryside dairy haven. At the heart of their display is their niche: dairy. Their flagship items including flavored fresh milk in delightful variants and the innovative Squassio ice cream made from squash, are all born from research that reflects the campus's academic focus on dairy and agriculture.

At Ytawes Fresh, CSU Piat proves that freshness, warmth, and academic purpose can come together in one welcoming, delicious booth.

Palmira – CSU Sanchez Mira

Among the vibrant offerings of this year's expo, the CSU Sanchez Mira Campus presents Palmira—a creative branding that celebrates innovation through nature's most versatile resource: the palm tree. Aptly named, "Palmira" is a fusion of palm and Sanchez Mira, reflecting both the origin and essence of

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their creations.

The booth itself is a feast for the senses. From charming novelty items to locally made delicacies, Palmira showcases an impressive variety—coco chandeliers that cast soft, natural light; keychains and soap dishes crafted from coconut shells; and nipa vinegar, spicy vinegar, and bignay wine that offer bold, native flavors.

The sweet richness of coco jam, the savory aroma of longganisa, and the refreshing tang of coconut-based condiments are sure to leave anyone craving more. Each piece and product speaks to Sanchez Mira's commitment to innovation and their ability to create value from the resources abundantly available around them.

Through Palmira, they prove that with creativity and care, even the simplest local materials can bloom into something remarkable.

Amianay – CSU Solana

Amianay from CSU Solana introduced itself not with

fanfare, but with the quiet confidence of a community that knows its roots. Derived from "amia" (north) and "ay" (palay), Amianay translates to Palay of the North-a fitting name for a booth grounded in the rice-rich identity of Solana, presenting its harvests: Rice Coffee, Rice Wine, Rice Vinegar, Pigmented Rice, Baked Sushi. Echoing the rhythm of the paddies and the spirit of farmers, the booth showcased rice not only as food but as culture transformed. Pickled Papaya, and Pickled Ampalaya also lined the tables, each jar and bottle a distilled memory of Solana's local flavors.

The pride of their booth, however, was the Red Rice Kropek, a product of ongoing research and development at CSU Solana. Flavored with shrimp and moringa, it was more than a snack, it was proof that tradition and innovation can co-exist on a single bite.

Every product at Amianay was a testament to the university's commitment to research-based community development, giving local harvests new life and economic purpose.

In bringing their products to a broader audience, CSU Solana was not merely promoting local goods—it was telling Solana's story, one rice grain at a time.

The SARABO Achievement Hub stands as a testament to the unity of CSUans in championing research, sustainability, and community-rooted innovation. It stands as living proof of how far the CSU's roots have reached and how brightly its branches continue to grow.

In contrast, "kammel" involves catching fish with bare hands, showcasing quick reflexes and familiarity with the water. Both methods reflect the community's deep-rooted fishing culture and connection to their environment. Awards were given based on which teams caught the biggest fish and the highest total number of catches.

Ahead of the curve

In the afternoon, faculty members channeled their creativity and intellect during the Cagayan State University Innovation Challenge Pitching Competitions, held at the Gatchalian Building with the theme, "Fostering Innovation through Research Commercialization".

Each pitcher was given five minutes to present and three

minutes to answer questions from the panelists.

The Idea Pitch Category included the following innovations: Gridshield Analytics: A Typhoon Resiliency Simulation and Mapping Tool; SmartAgriGate: A Self-Powered Intelligent Irrigation Gate System with Remote Monitoring and Control; MicroBoost: The Hidden Microbial Gems in Bamboo Agroforestry; "Agricool" Smart Greenhouse Small-Scale, Modular, Climate-Controlled, and Solar-Powered Pig House; Flood Watch; NipaBrigs A Sustainable Charcoal Briquette from Nipa Palm Fronds, Gatacube: Shelf-Stable Coconut Milk Cubes for Instant Use; CHREWS: A Smart IoT-Based Classroom Heat Risk and Environment Wellness System with

Predictive Alerts and Adaptive Response; Biopesticides: Harnessing Botanical Extracts for the Management of Lepidopteran Pests in Major Philippine Crops; Bio-Nhibitor: **Bio-Alternative Nitrification** Inhibitor for Slow-Release N Fertilizer Solar-Powered Flood Monitoring and Alert System with Real-Time SMS.O; and AgriFUND, Growing Resilience through Regenerative Agriculture Meanwhile, the Technology Pitch Category consisted of: Conversion of Conventional Tricycle to e-trike (C-Trike); Mango Fruit Bar; Cacao Tinupig, Essential Oil Extractor; Milky Bamb; and Small-Scale Climate-Controlled Chick Brooder.
