2. Literacy and Numeracy Program for Children of Coco Farmers/Tenants
3. Enhancing the Productivity of Small Scale coconut Farmers Through Technology Diffusion of Coco-Based Food and Non-Food Products

Production of Good Agricultural Practices in Banana Production

Banana is one of the focus commodities of CSU Lasam and Piat where their service areas are the barangays in the hilly areas of Lasam, Piat and Rizal, Cagayan. Bananas which were planted decades ago were never rehabilitated hence production is poor and low in quality. To upgrade the plantations, trainings on new technologies and good agricultural practices were conducted (Table 27):

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The Giant Bamboo

Bamboo is one of the priority commodities of CSU Gonzaga and CSU Piat. Being a versatile and strong plant, it can thrive in adverse soil and weather conditions making it suitable as reforestation species in the rolling areas of Cagayan that are vulnerable to erosion.

The highlight of accomplishments in the project "Bamboo Production and Utilization" include the:

1. Establishment of a bamboo nursery at CSU Gonzaga where at least 8 varieties are propagated;
2. Establishment of a technology demonstration area with different varieties of bamboo;
3. Dispersion of 285 bamboo seedlings to farmers for erosion control; and,
4. Conduct a training on Bamboo Propagation Technology.

Upscaling Organic Fertilizer Production

The urgency to protect and enhance the nutrient cycle and soil fertility prompted the government to implement the Organic Agriculture Act of 2010. Hence, the university started its advocacy on healthy soil, and healthy food. Generally, the project aims to upscale the production of organic fertilizer and enhance the skills of local farmers through the adoption of GAP on organic fertilizer production through vermicomposting.

Specifically, it aims to:

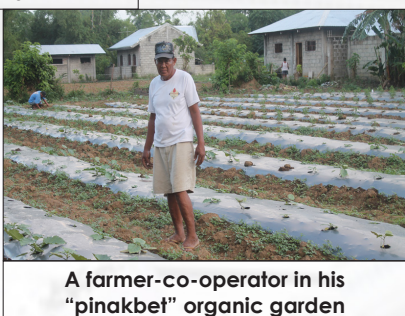
1. Develop an environment friendly agri- enterprise;
2. Increase production of organic fertilizer through the utilization of solid waste generated in the communities;
3. Increase income of farmer- co-operators;
4. Job generation/employment.

TECHNICAL ADVISORY & EXTENSION

Aside from trainings conducted, technical assistance was also given to farmers who have already adopted the vermicomposting technology. To date, there are 310 individual adopters and 1 coop adopter.

Urban Organic Vegetable Production

Vegetables have become an integral part of Filipino meals and diets. To have an access to safe and healthy food and in support to food security program of the government, the university in collaboration with the City Agriculture Office of Tuguegarao, joined efforts in the advocacy for chemical-free/healthy and affordable food. In support to this program, technology demonstration areas were established in three cluster barangays of Tuguegarao City. The project was on organic vegetable production done in containers or limited space in the backyards of urban dwellers/households.

Trainings were conducted on the following areas:

1. Organic liquid fertilizer from plants, fruits and fish entrails;
2. Organic pesticides;
3. Organic fertilizer from animal waste and vegetable trimmings;
4. Cultural practices on urban organic vegetable production;
5. Vermicomposting technology

VISION SERVICES

There were three technology demonstration areas established, one managed by the barangay officials and the other two run by households.

The interventions introduced were:

1. Use of vermicompost as soil conditioner;
2. Use of organic concoctions as foliar fertilizer and plant/disease prevention and control;
3. Container gardening using recycled materials as container.

The Campus Extension Office conducted several consultative meetings with the City Government and Barangay Chairmen regarding the problem on solid waste .

Environmental Protection and Management

Environmental protection and management is everybody's concern. Due to increasing population of Tuguegarao City including transients, solid waste management and pollution of rivers and air are becoming major problems. Hence, the following projects are being implemented by CSU Carig campus to at least mitigate these problems:

1. "Paguruffunan" Community-Based Eco-Saver Project . "Paguruffunan" means concerted effort of the whole community to muster the problem on solid waste. This project is a partnership with LGU Tuguegarao and focuses on wastes management and organic gardening.
2. Environment Management and Conservation. This aims to promote green environment through advocacy, trainings and tree planting among residents and farmers particularly in the watersheds of Peñablanca, Cagayan and riverbanks of Tuguegarao City.

Integrated Animal Health Care

This project is lodged at the College of Veterinary Medicine ,Carig Campus with two components:

1. Canine Vaccination for Anti-Rabies Prevention. This is coupled with advocacy/seminars on the advantages of dog vaccination, pet shows and others
2. Castration and Vitamins Administration. This dealt with animal health management particularly of parasite and disease prevention

Empowering the Elderly through Supportive Programs and Services

The elderly or known as "Senior Citizens" are viewed as frail and often neglected or overlooked with regard to their contribution in the development of the community.

Considering main-streaming of the marginalized groups under Gender and Development, there is a need to recognize and locate them in areas where their wisdom and skills can contribute to community development.

With this in mind, CSU conducted the following:

1. Profiling of Senior Citizens in Barangay Carig - where there are 80 senior citizens, three are "pensionados" and the rest are indigent.
2. Organizing the senior citizens of Barangay Carig, Tuguegarao City
3. Vermiculture & Vermicomposting - this is a group project of the senior citizens in Barangay Tanza in relation to solid waste management.



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Integrated Coastal Resources Management: Mangrove Rehabilitation and Plantation Establishment

This project is implemented by CSU Aparri in collaboration with LGUs of Aparri, Buguey, Sta. Ana and Sta. Teresita mainly to ensure marine resource sustainability. The project has three components :

1. Aforestation/Reforestation of Mangrove Areas
2. Community-Based Multi Species Hatchery
3. Aquasilviculture

CSU conducts seminar-workshop on outcomes-based gender sensitive curriculum

The Andrews Gender and Development (GAD) Office in coordination with the University GAD Office started conducting a series of seminar-workshops on outcomes-based and gender oriented curriculum with the faculty members of Andrews Campus.

With the theme Gender Sensitivity in Lifelong Learning, the seminar-workshops held at the Andrews Amphitheater enabled teachers to come up with syllabi responsive to the learning needs of the students and with the integration of gender-related topics and activities in teaching.

The first batch of seminar-workshop was conducted with all the regular and part-time faculty members of the College of Industry Management (CHIM) on February 26-27, 2015, while the second batch was held on March 12-13, 2015 with faculty members from the College of Teacher Education (CTE) of the different campuses, namely: Andrews, Aparri, Gonzaga, Piat, Sanchez Mira, Lasam, and Lal-lo.

The speakers invited were Dr. Nelson Calvin; Dr. Sofia Taguibao, (Education Supervisors II) and Dr. Florida Capili, all from of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED); Dr. Hortencia Calvin, of the Department of Education (DepEd), Region 02; Prof. Antonio Tamayao of CTE; and Dr. Jocelyn D. Tuscano, University GAD Focal Person.

The seminar-workshop, initiated by the Andrews GAD Focal Person, Dr. Romeo C. Clemente, is an avenue for the CSU faculty members to facilitate teaching-learning approaches which are outcomes-based and gender sensitive.

Another batch of seminar-workshop was set for the faculty members of the College of Business Entrepreneurship and Accountancy (CBEA) and College of Allied Health Sciences (CAHS).

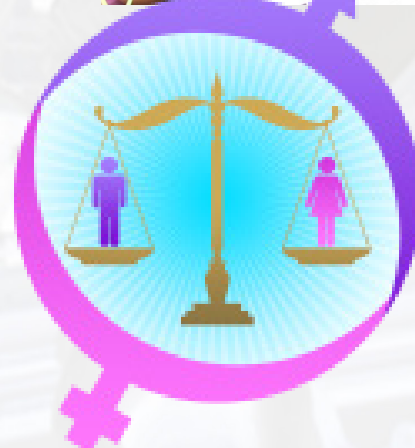

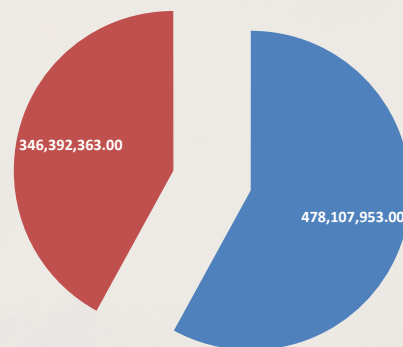

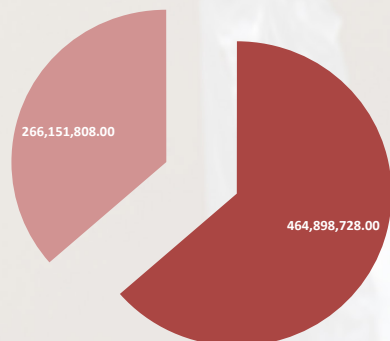


■ TOTAL OPERATING BUDGET-GENERAL FUND ■ TOTAL OPERATING BUDGET- SPECIAL BUDGET FUND

National SCUAA 2015 Olympics opens

Known for its pancit batil patong and its Cagayan River, the longest and the largest river in the archipelago, Tuguegarao City has once more been put in the national map as it hosts the National State Colleges and Universities Athletic Association (SCUAA) 2015 Olympic Games, which formally opened yesterday at the newly refurbished Cagayan Sports Complex with Cagayan State University as host.

At 6:30 a.m., a parade around the city closely secured by the members of the Philippine National Police started the week-long Olympic Games, which is co-hosted by the Provincial Government of Cagayan and the local government unit of Tuguegarao City, with participants from 112 SUCs sporting their colorful uniforms and banners and ushered by 9 drum and lyre bands coming from the Department of Education schools.

Although the weather was a bit on the cold side, and it was drizzling at the early part of the morning, the sportsfest was formally opened by the Philippine Association of State Universities and Colleges (PASUC) President Dr. Ricardo E. Rotoras.

Rep. Roman Romulo, chair of the house committee on higher and technical education, graced the opening ceremony of the sportsfest with around 5,000 athletes and officials who will vie for top honors led by the perennial champion, National Capital Region, and who the congressman described as the future sports superstars of the Asian Games, or possibly, Olympic Games.

Aside from Romulo, the other notable personalities present at the ceremony covered live by local and national media were Cagayan Governor Alvaro Antonio, Cagayan Third District Rep. Randolph Ting, Tuguegarao Mayor Engelbert Caronan, COO-NATTCO Rep. Anthony Bravo, Commission on Higher Education Commissioner Alex Brillantes and CSU President Dr. Romeo R. Quilang, who, on behalf of the other four SUCs in Region 2, welcomed the delegations in his opening



remarks.

To highlight the ceremony and to welcome the delegates, guests and visitors to the city, about 9,000 basic physical education students of CSU coming from its Carig and Andrews campuses performed an enthralling 20-minute field demonstration, which is believed to be a 'potential' Guinness record.

Participants of the competitions, supervised by PASUC, will compete in 21 sporting events, namely, athletics, badminton, baseball, basketball, chess, dancesports, football, lawn tennis, sepak takraw, softball, swimming, taekwondo, table tennis, volleyball, beach volleyball, arnis, karatedo, pencak silat, futsal, boxing, and archery.

Hostilities kicked off 1 p.m. of the same day with the finals of all the events including the awards and closing ceremonies to be held on Feb. 14.

Western Mindanao, NCR, Cordillera, Ilocos, Cagayan Valley, Central Luzon, Southern Tagalog, Bicol, Western Visayas, Central Visayas, Eastern Visayas, ARMM, Northern Mindanao, SOCSARGEN, CARAGA and Davao are the participating regions.

CSU celebrates 37th anniversary as state university

The Cagayan State University celebrated its 37th founding anniversary as a state university on June 11 with the theme, "CSU at 37: Going World Class."

Administration distributes incentive to employees

A total of 564 permanent employees qualified for the incentive. Under EO 181, casuals, consultants and employees hired on job order or contract of service are not covered by PEI.

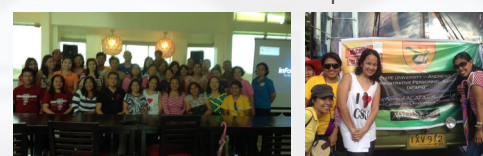
Before the benchmarking activity, the group went for a pilgrimage to the renowned larger-

Students, faculty members, personnel observe Ash Wednesday

Catholics at CSU Andrews Campus observed Ash Wednesday on Feb. 18 by joining a Eucharistic Celebration where they had ash placed on their foreheads to indicate their participation in the 40-day season of Lent.

Students, faculty members, administrative personnel and officials gathered at the Andrews Gymnasium to hear mass at 9 a.m. organized by the Office of Student Services and Welfare. The participants attending the mass presided over by Fr. Ferdinand Baculi of the St. Peter's Metropolitan Cathedral Parish had their foreheads placed with ash to remind them of their origin and destiny and the call for repentance.

Fr. Baculi and lay ministers who served at the mass made the sign of the cross while placing ashes on the foreheads of each and said, "Repent and believe in the Gospel. In its article published on inquirer.net on Feb. 13, 2013, 'Cebu Daily News' said the ashes used are made of burnt palms that were blessed during last year's Palm Sunday and are sprinkled with holy water or oil and smoked with incense.

Quoting Cebu Archbishop Jose Palma, the paper said all Catholics aged 18 to 60 are obliged to fast or to eat less on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday which is April 3 this year. Under Church law, the paper said, fasting meant eating only one meal and taking two small snacks not equivalent to a meal in a day.

"Fasting has been relaxed in places where there is low food supply and for ailing people. Also today and in all Fridays of Lent, Catholics at least 14 years old are obliged to abstain from eating meat," the newspaper said. Based on Church practice, the 40-day season of Lent is where Catholics commemorate the passion, death, and resurrection of the Lord.

The season culminates on Holy Week, which starts this year on March 29, Palm Sunday. Easter Sunday is on April 5.
