OPEN FORUM

Mr. Artemio Antolin, a participant from Environment and Development Alternative Solutions Services appreciated CSU's performance for surpassing the targets on 14 indicators as mentioned during the presentation of 2023 Accomplishments. He also observed that despite this performance, the budget utilization rate is only 96%. He raised his interest in what contributes to achieving more than 100% physical accomplishments without fully utilizing the budget.

Mr. Alvin Alisasis, University Budget Officer explained that, for PS and MOOE, once the University has finished its activities and projects, it is deemed to have savings. However, for the Capital Outlay, these are the projects for infrastructures, which can be realized later which means cannot be directly attributable to the achievement of the current physical targets. He added that the unutilized portion of the budget was due to the failure of biddings during procurement activities.

Another concern of Mr. Antolin was the implication of more than 100% accomplishment despite of existence of an unutilized budget on the Budget Proposal. According to him, this might lead to the reduction of the budget since it appears that CSU can surpass its targets with a lesser

budget. Mr. Alisasis responded that this is also one of the sentiments of the University on setting the targets for GAA. Despite the University's high performance, there's still a limited budget due to the adoption of Conservative TIER 1. That is why the University does not rely only on the Executive Department at DBM, but also does Lobby to Congress. Mr. Antolin expressed his fear of the justification of the Budget but was also convinced that it's a matter of how the University defends its budget.

A query was raised by Mr. Antolin regarding the research performance. He asked if the CSU performance of research in terms of outcomes or impact can be seen outside; and how the University monitors the impact on adoptors. He suggested broadening or innovating research that will include how to monitor the performance of the adopters.

Mr. Antolin also expressed his concern about how the University ensures that the students can have that kind of skills or technology that can be applied especially in agriculture as a priority program. He mentioned the mindset of Industrial Countries or First World Countries on skills that we learned and then skills that we apply. Thereby suggesting **OJT of the students in the field like Agriculture Students.**

Engr. Arthur Ibañez, OIC University President appreciated Mr. Antolin for his valuable suggestions. He mentioned that there are products of CSU that were adopted by companies and/or cooperatives. He named some of the latest products developed by the different campuses of CSU. He further explained that in terms of monitoring, there is a problem with the feedback from the adaptors; they do not fully cooperate. He pointed out that monitoring processes are in place but less cooperation from adaptors.

On the issue of whether graduates can also learn technology aside from their diploma, OIC President Ibañez discussed how active the University Campuses are in National Certifications. He explained that students can earn not only diplomas but also skills after graduation. He cited some of the skills that can be earned from the Assessment Centers available at the University through the help of TESDA.

An additional recommendation was given by Mr. Antolin. According to him, it is important to highlight the ownership of CSU for every product or technology adopted by companies/and or cooperatives. This is a way of communicating the performance of the University and a way to influence the mindset of local or international companies and the common people.

Ms. Magdalena Gomez, the DICT R02 representative raised her interest in the University's Program on ICT. She asked whether it was included in the Budget Proposal. In response, the OIC President Ibañez ensured the inclusion of ICT in the Budget Proposal and even highlighted the "Digitalization of CSU Operations" as part of the proposal. He further elaborated that the ICT component is University-wide and it includes enrollment to employment.

Another query of the DICT R02 representative was the inclusion of ICT on the (Key Performance Indicators (KPIs). The OIC University President disclosed that these KPIs were set for all SUCs in the Philippines by CHED-DBM. He further explained that ICT is embedded in targets even if not presented in detail.

The OIC University President expressed his utmost gratitude to all participants from the different from the different Civil Society Organizations (CSOs). He also acknowledged the donations of DICT to the University. In his final statements, he mentioned the suggestion of Loreto Pacay for CSU, DA, and other Agencies on the Development of Solar Panel with low price to be given to Farmers like low-cost solar powered Motor-Pump.

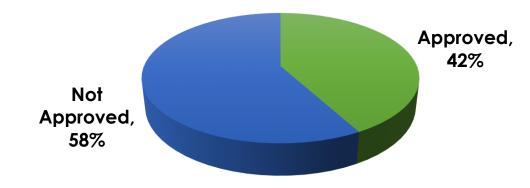

IV. OPEN FORUM

Former Director Lorence Caranguian inquired on what specific assistance does the University want from the CSOs. Pres. Alvarado responded that the University welcomes proposals from the CSOs for integration in the University Budget.

Mr. Caranguian pointed out that Tier II proposals are not assured. He then asked what are the priorities. Pres. Alvarado answered that those with phases or are continuing shall be prioritized. She said that if Congress will not approve, the University will look for sponsors.

Mr. Caranguian suggested that a budget on a campus-level basis be prepared indicating the guaranteed or assured projects. He also suggested that the proposals be rationalized on a per program level.

Mr. Caranguian inquired on the percentage of the budget dedicated to Fisheries, Agriculture and to the other industries. He then suggested to prepare a matrix for easier reference. He also suggested to identify the outputs and outcomes. He noted that there were no



indicators presented as basis for the determination of the impact. He suggested to incorporate this in the budget.

Pres. Alvarado stated that the projects should not deviate from the thrusts of the University. She clarified that the University's focus is on research but it may extend assistance for commercialization. She observed that there is a lack of convergence among agencies in terms of research and outputs.

Mr. Dennis Domingo inquired on the roles of the LGU in the areas of Economic Dynamism, Government Efficiency, Infrastructure, Resiliency and Innovation. Pres. Alvarado responded that it is in the community that the strength of Production lies.

Dr. Arthur Ibañez, CEO of Carig Campus, explained the e-trike project. He said that MSMEs who can adopt the e-trike will be identified. He mentioned that they have an ETEEAP program which caters to those who do not have College degrees. The program enables them to earn a degree in Bachelor of Public Administration. They can also train Barangay officials in terms of administration, ordinance-making and technology. This is part of the Extension project of the University.

Pres. Alvarado also mentioned about Solid Waste Management.

Mr. Antolin suggested to disaggregate the budget. Inputs should be indicated (ex. where to use the infrastructure). Mr. Caranguian also suggested to disaggregate per district to see the distribution of resources and explore opportunities for expansion across all districts. He added that a Strategic Implementation Plan containing the strategies to implement the budget may also be prepared where opportunities for partnerships can be identified.

Mr. Arturo Tabbu noticed that there is no budget for Solana campus to support its projects. Pres. Alvarado clarified that there will be a budget coming from Congressman Joseph Lara.



It was also noted that CSU has no degree in Forestry. Pres. Alvarado answered that Forestry is offered in ISU. She mentioned that BS Climate Change and Resiliency and Environmental Science are offered at CSU Carig Campus.

Pres. Alvarado recalled that DOST initiated a project before wherein LGU Sanchez Mira had a corresponding ordinance to disallow cutting trees. It was suggested that tagging system should be implemented by CSU Sanchez Mira for monitoring. This can be a project in partnership with the LGU. Pres. Alvarado said that CSU Sanchez Mira can help plant coconut in identified areas. She advised Dr. Rodel Alegado, CEO of Sanchez Mira Campus, to seek endorsement from the CSOs for the proposal with the PCA. This was duly noted by Dr. Alegado.

Mr. Caranguian suggested to create a pool of experts from the retirees. Pres. Alvarado agreed and added that they can benchmark from the Experts Pool Program of DOST for possible presentation to the Board of Regents.

Mr. Antolin suggested to conduct researches which can give immediate feedback to the community such as to the farmers (ex. soil analysis to determine the amount of fertilizers appropriate to a certain area). Mr. Caranguian added that researches should help preserve indigenous knowledge, address the problems in the conventional ways of doing things and address specific problems in the community. He said that researchable areas should be identified. CEO Hitler responded that this is already being done in CSU. Research outputs are being adopted by the farmers and other beneficiaries.

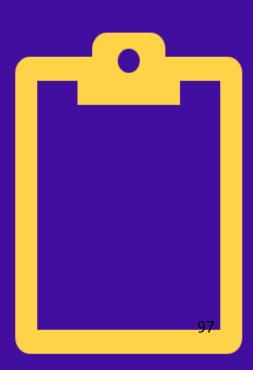

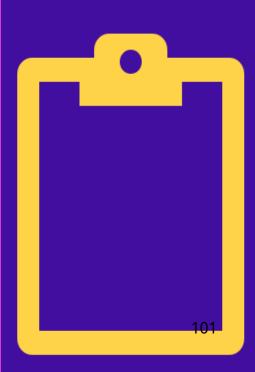
