CESTEEPH Program presented in Indonesia

Community Empowerment thru Science, Technology, Education, Environmental Protection and Health



As a manifestation of the University's commitment to its existing partnership with SEAMEO BIOTROP, President Tejada presented a paper entitled Community Empowerment through Science, Technology, Education, Environmental Protection and Health (CESTEEPH): A Collaborative Communitybased Program for the Conservation, Restoration and Sustainable Utilization of Mangrove Ecosystems in Gonzaga, Cagayan, Region 02, Philippines during the 3rd International Conference on Tropical Biology in Bogor, Indonesia on September 21, 2018. The only panelist from the Philippines during the panel discussion on the Future Directions in Conservation, Enhancement and Sustainable Use of Indigenous Tropical Flora and Fauna, Dr. Tejada presented the CESTEEPH program which is a multi-agency program having CSU as the lead agency, with Dr. Froilan A. Pacris, Jr. as the program leader. This program is an offshoot of a MOA signing between CSU and SEAMEO Regional Center for Tropical Biology (Biotrop) in Brune, Darussalam on October 18, 2017 to form a cooperation on the joint implementation of RDE activities on tropical biology and related concerns with focus on the conservation and sustainable use of MANGROVE Ecosystem. This is in line with the thrust of the university to strengthen linkages and collaborations with local and international academic and research institutions and to put CSU in the global academic map.

In her presentation, Pres. Tejada highlighted the various mangrove restoration efforts of the university and partner agencies in the coastal communities of Gonzaga, Cagayan to include capacity building, academic and community involvement and research.

A Seminar-Workshop was conducted by CESTEEPH on "Propagation of Mangrove Species, Nursery Management, Sustainable Mangrove Forest Management and Aquasilviculture with Financial Management and Marketing".




Figure 1. Gross Income per Campus (3rd Quarter)

The total gross income proceeds from the income generating projects of the 8 campuses of the University is Php 4,500,671.23. The bulk of the gross income were from Sanchez Mira, Carig and Andrews campuses. The sales generated from this campuses is attributed to several factors such as the opening of academic year 2018-2019 which led to increase in uniform sales and the harvest season of rice. It should also be noted that in September 15, 2018 typhoon Ompong had a landfall in the province which destroyed crops, dairy products and facilities of IGP in different campuses.
