for enrollees on June 2022. Classes are expected to open in August 2022 with 5 curricular offerings which are: Bachelor of Science in Fisheries, Bachelor of Science in Criminology, Bachelor of Elementary Education, Bachelor of Science in Information Technology, and Bachelor of Science in Agriculture major in Animal Science and major in Crop Science. CSU FORMS SINAG CAGAYAN VALLEY CONSORTIUM

goal of developing and enhancing the startup ecosystem in Cagayan Valley, a pool of institutions and organizations gathered together for the MOA Signing of the Establishment of the Synergistic, Innovative, and Agile Cagayan Valley Consortium (SINAG Cagayan Valley) last March 29, 2022 at the Claude Andrews Convention Center, CSU-Andrews.

The SINAG Cagayan Valley Consortium aims to establish a regional startup development platform to build and strengthen the startup ecosystem in Region 02. It features a regional startup development program to develop strategies to promote the startup programs of

startup enablers, establish a pool of mentors and conduct mentorship programs,



implement skills enhancement activities for the TBI team and other startup enablers, implement collaborative programs/activities, and harmonize the services offered by the different partner agencies in order to strengthen Cagayan Valley's startup ecosystem.

In her welcome remarks, University President Urdujah G. Alvarado expressed the significance of SINAG as "it will serve as a strong arm in providing resources that startups need to thrive and build their businesses" and congratulated Dr. Jose Guzman for initiating the consortium's creation.

The Consortium is composed of the Department of Science and Technology Region 02, Department of Information



and Communications Technology Region 02, Department of Trade and Industry Region 02, Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and the Department of Agriculture Region Region 02. Academic institution partners include Isabela State University, Nueva Vizcaya State University. All agencies expressed their commitment to the goals of the consortium.

Moreover, Quirino State University and St. Luis University were also present as they delivered their impressions and expressed their willingness to join the consortium.

President Alvarado also affirmed the collaboration and adherence of the consortium towards alleviating startups. "We will not only help start up but develop full-fledged entrepreneurs. We look forward to more outputs and greater impact for all of us, forward, march," she said.

CSU'S 3 PEANUT TECHNOLOGIES TAKES ON DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE COUNTRY

Peanut Industry in the Philippines is one of the industries that relies heavily on manual labor. Moreover, this kind of legume requires an intensive post-harvest process in order to meet the demands of mass production. This poses a problem since postharvest losses are marked at 16% due to the high percentage of pods that are left in the soil. Thus, the need for the mechanization of processing peanuts for a maximum yield each harvest.

This is a reality that was taken on by Cagayan State University as it developed three technologies, which were all developed under the research project, "Pilot Testing of Peanut Postharvest Mechanization and Bulk Storage Technologies", a research project led by Dr. Jose B. Guzman and his team and supported by the Philippine

Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development of the Department of Science and Technology (DOST-PCAARRD) through funding.

In an article by DOST-PCAARRD S&T Media Services, CSU has completed pilot testing in Region I (Vintar, Ilocos Norte), Region VI (San Joaquin, Iloilo), and Region X (Claveria, Misamis Oriental). This allowed for access to new tools for peanut farmers and cooperators to upgrade their postharvest handling, processing, storage, and marketing practices.

The Peanut Stripper is a machine that separates the pods from the vines of the peanut plants using a rotating cylinder and a belt conveyor stripping assembly. The machine's performance could range from 4 to 18 times the capacity of a skilled farmer.

The Peanut Sheller, on the other hand, is utilized for shelling small, medium, and large podded varieties by changing the concave clearance. The machine breaks and separates the kernels from the pods through impact action, and cleans the kernels through aspiration. Furthermore, it sorts the cleaned kernels into different size classes through a series of oscillating sieves.

In the case of the Peanut Bulk Storage, an aerated peanut bulk storage system is a structure used to store in-shell peanut pods. It is equipped with a system that monitors the temperature and humidity inside and outside the storage bin. The system also automatically maintains the conditions inside the bin for optimal storage conditions through automatic aeration. The system is further equipped with a remote monitoring mechanism wherein storage conditions are shown in an almost real-time manner. -UIO

agayan State University and the Department of Science and Technology Technology issued a Licensing Agreement for the mass production and commercialization of innovated CSU's Peanut Stripper, Peanut Sheller, and Aerated Bulk Storage to ACT Machineries, a frontline producer and supplier of farm machinery in the Philippines,

on March 25, 2022.

Dr. Jose Guzman, the creator of the technology, University President Urdujah G. Alvarado, and other university officials attended the event.

Moreover, a site visit to ACT Machineries in Cauayan, Isabela was made by the President and other officials to benchmark on best practices for peanut production. JUIO




CSU RECEIVES 2.9M GRANT FOR HE

CSU-Gonzaga students will also be welcomed with new facilities such as the two 2-storey Academic and Laboratory Buildings for the

In the case of other campuses, one completed building for CSU-Andrews Campus (5-storey **CBEA** Building), CSU-Piat (College of Agriculture), CSU-Sanchez Mira (College of Teacher Education), and CSU-Aparri (Academic Cum Laboratory Building) were all finished at the end of 2021.

other hand, On the CSU-Lasam Campus has 2-storey Academic and

Laboratory Building which is 56% completed. CSU is also currently minting the 9th campus in Iraga, Solana which is also under construction.

Furthermore, University President Alvarado said that there will surely be more projects in the months to come as the university is lucky to have partners in making sure that quality education is provided by CSÚ.

Rest assured, students will surely have a better academic home waiting for them! 💝 -UIO














CSU RECOGNIZED AS TO PH BY AD SCIENT

Dr. Munoz is the inventor of the Sunberry (Bignay) Food Supplement of CSU, which incorporates Bignay, a fruit that is particularly abundant in the Cagayan Valley region and is commonly used for respiratoryrelated health problems.

In accordance with published announcements that face-to-face classes are now allowed for localities under Level 1 restriction, Cagayan State University prepared for the safe conduct of face-to-face classes for priority academic

programs that are identified by the national government.

The Safety Seal Certification was secured by the colleges from the Local Government Unit of Tuguegarao. After being evaluated and marked compliant with the minimum health standards, the College of Allied Health Sciences in CSU-Andrews and the College of Engineering and Architecture in CSU-Carig have been approved for gradual face-to-face classes.

The training workshop is an offshoot of the visit of CSU officials led by Pres. Urdujah G. Alvarado last December 23, 2021, where she and CvSU President Hernando Robles met and agreed to strengthen

the Cafe Valena Project and train coffee growers from other CSU campuses on coffee production, processing, and commercialization through the mentorship of CvSU. As an immediate response, President Robles dispatched eight coffee experts, led by Director Gerry M. Castillo of the CvSU National Coffee Research and Development and Extension Center, to preassess the CSU Lal-lo Coffee

Plantations on January 11, 2022. The pre-assessment was done to identify the current status of the existing coffee plantation, to determine the suitability of growing coffee in the expansion area, and to recommend interventions for the assessed coffee production sites. The pre-assessment findings and observations were discussed during the opening program.

President Alvarado in her

response, thanked President Robles for sending his coffee staff to CSU and she hopes that this initial activity will bring new frontiers in the coffee industry, especially in Cagayan. She also hopes that this may signal more synergy in research and the practice of sharing expertise among campuses as they work together towards one goal.

Moreover, the implications of the findings on the policies and programs in different sectors, which include: Vital Health and Family Plannning, Social Welfare and Development, and Peace and Human Rights were also discussed.

1heCollege of Agriculture at Cagayan State University Lal-lo **a**t successfully passed the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) monitoring and evaluation last March 9-10, 2022, with its existing conditions and in programs instruction. research. extension, and production.

According to Dr. Maribel Fernandez, dean of the College of Agriculture, the two-day evaluation involved an in-person inspection and monitoring of conditions to maintain high professional, ethical, and technical standards in the practice of agriculture as a profession.

"With only weeks of



preparation, I am happy to hear positive feedback and comments from the evaluators. Although we have some areas that need to be improved, the college has passed the evaluation," she said.

Led by PRC Region 2's Chief Professional Regulations Officer, Dr. Arnel M. Melad, and Professional Regulatory Board for Agriculture Chairperson, Hon. Emma K. Sales, the team examined the duties and responsibilities visà-vis the qualifications and credentials of the faculty and staff, observed the conditions affecting the practice of the agriculture profession,

including the facilities and equipment, compliance with the professional, ethical, and technical standards of practice; and the curriculum, faculty, library, facilities, and the overall administration of the program offered. The college was found to be strong in research, production, extension, and facilities.

The Dean said the college needs to improve its faculty profile since the college has only 10 permanent faculty members and has not yet complied with the requirement set by the Commission on Higher Education to at least have 16 faculty members with plantilla positions.

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
