## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Cagayan State University (CSU) concluded the year with a comprehensive presentation of institutional accomplishments during its Year-End Performance Review, held on December 22, 2025, at the CSU Carig Campus Red Eagle Gymnasium.

All University Vice Presidents and Campus Executive Officers from the university's nine campuses presented their respective accomplishments through audio-visual reports,

highlighting progress across key functional areas. The presentations reflected CSU's sustained growth in instruction, administration and finance, research and development, extension services, internationalization, partnerships, and resource mobilization.

Meanwhile, the 2025 President's Report showcased the collective milestones of CSU, aligned with Ambisyon Natin 2040, the Cagayan Valley Development Plan 2024–2028, and the Sustainable

Development Goals (SDGs). The report emphasized how CSU continues to lead with vision and action amid the growing demands of higher education—remaining relevant, inclusive, and community-oriented.

The report underscored that the gains achieved in 2025 were the result of shared leadership and coordinated efforts across campuses, academic units, and support offices.

Adding a festive and celebratory close to the

program was the annual Sayawitan, where faculty and staff across campuses and central administration showcased singing and dance performances inspired by Filipino Christmas traditions and their chosen SDGs.

CSU Sanchez Mira Campus emerged as champion, winning ₱50,000, followed by Gonzaga Campus with ₱30,000, and Andrews Campus with ₱20,000. The remaining teams received ₱10,000 consolation prizes. 🏆

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# CSU HOLDS 2025 INTERNATIONAL TVET CONFERENCE; WELCOMES DELEGATES ACROSS 14 COUNTRIES



Cagayan State University (CSU) officially opened the 2025 International Conference on Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) at the Claude Andrews Convention Center on October 30.

With the theme “Global Landscape: Aligning TVET and Industry for Sustainable Development,” the two-day event gathered delegates from 14 countries, including the Philippines, and 44 participants from various institutions across the country.

In her welcome address, Andrews Campus CEO Atty. Carla Marie Sumigad recognized the conference as a vital platform for exchanging ideas, sharing best practices, and building partnerships that go beyond borders, adding that collective vision and collaboration are essential to aligning education with industry needs.

“This conference provides a platform for exchanging ideas, sharing best practices, and fostering partnerships that transcend borders,” she said.

In addition, Engr. Roger Rumpon, CEO of CSU-Carig Campus, affirmed the university’s commitment to forge inclusive partnerships toward the achievement

of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). He also urged participants to work collectively in developing TVET curricula that respond to global workforce demands.

“Let us explore ways to strengthen the vital alliance that reinforces the critical education-to-employment transition and to craft and facilitate a harmonized global credential recognition,” he stressed.

Moreover, CSU Officer-in-Charge President Dr. Arthur Ibañez underscored the vision behind the international conference, saying it was founded on the belief that education rooted in skills, inclusivity, and innovation can uplift lives and build resilient communities.

He stressed that academic institutions must continuously modernize their programs and align them with emerging technologies to make learning more experiential and industry-driven.

“Here at CSU, our own TVET programs embody the same spirit across our campuses. We offer skills-based programs in partnership with TESDA Region II. These programs open doors to employment and empower communities in the region,” he added.

Over the next two days, Dr. Ibañez shared, the conference will focus on four key themes that define the future of technical and vocational education and training.

“This is part of our continuing pursuit of academic excellence, global engagement, and social responsibility. Through partnerships like this, we strengthen our commitment to quality assurance, innovation, and lifelong learning,” Dr. Ibañez highlighted.

Delivering his keynote address, Professor Dr. Suresh Kumar Dhameja, Director General of the Colombo Plan Staff College, highlighted the growing global relevance of TVET. He observed that while automation and artificial intelligence (AI) continue to reshape industries, skilled professionals remain indispensable.

“AI may replace the technicians, but AI cannot replace skilled people,” Dr. Dhameja said, noting that in many parts of the world, TVET graduates are already earning more than traditional degree holders, a trend expected to accelerate in the years ahead.

He also emphasized the shift toward hybrid and learner-centered education, which empowers students

to take ownership of their learning even beyond formal schooling.

“We need to move from a teacher-led to a learner-led orientation, which is vital for the students of the future,” he explained.

Dr. Dhameja further highlighted the need for stronger collaboration between academia and industry to produce graduates ready to meet the evolving demands of automation, AI, and the green economy.

“TVET plays a critical role in developing a workforce capable of supporting the green economy, turning environmental responsibility into economic opportunity,” he added.

The two-day conference brings together international experts, educators, and policymakers in the TVET sector to exchange best practices and address emerging challenges in the field.

With international cooperation now underway, the event is expected to generate actionable outcomes, including joint research projects, student and faculty exchanges, and resource-sharing initiatives, all aimed at enhancing TVET effectiveness in the Philippines and beyond. 🇵🇭



# CSU OPENS 2025 NEXUS SUMMIT, WELCOMES GLOBAL PARTNERS FOR SUSTAINABLE FUTURE



**T**uguegarao City, Cagayan — Anchored on the theme, “Futures Thinking in Action: Integrating Science, Culture, and Innovation for Sustainable Development”, Cagayan State University (CSU) formally commenced the 2025 Nexus Summit, ushering in a three-day international convening at the CSU–Andrews Campus in Tuguegarao City.

Distinguished speakers and delegates from Indonesia, Malaysia, India, Thailand, and Taiwan, alongside representatives from numerous State Universities and Colleges across the Philippines, were warmly welcomed as CSU positioned the Cagayan Valley region as a rising hub for global academic collaboration.

CSU Andrews Campus Executive Officer Atty. Carla Marie L. Sumigad underscored the importance of unity and forward-looking partnerships. “This gathering serves as a call to action... [that] challenges each of us to share knowledge, test solutions, and build partnerships that can produce real impact,” she said.

Meanwhile, Dr. Ana Marie Cristina C. Cauilan, Vice President for Internationalization, Partnership, and Resource Mobilization, highlighted the years of groundwork that paved the way for this milestone event.

“The Nexus Summit was not created overnight; it is a product of long-term,

meaningful relationships with our foreign higher education institution partners,” she explained, noting that CSU envisioned “a different kind of conference — one that embodies CSU’s vision of bringing internationalization to the countryside and a platform where global perspectives would meet local realities.”

Dr. Kristinne Joyce A. Lara, Director for Internationalization, facilitated the presentation of participants representing partner institutions across Asia, symbolizing CSU’s expanding global network.

In his President’s Address, Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez, OIC of the Office of the University President, situated the summit within CSU’s broader academic agenda.

“The Nexus Summit is not an isolated undertaking. It is the natural progression of our internationalization efforts and the expansion of the red, blue, and green sustainable development goals interdisciplinary frameworks launched in 2024,” he noted.

Representing CHED Regional Director Dr. Julieta M. Paras, Internationalization Focal Person Ms. Jocelyn Carag emphasized the urgent need for ASEAN cooperation.

“In ASEAN, collaboration is not just a strategy—it is a survival skill,” she said, pointing out that issues such as climate change, food security, and social equity cross borders “as freely as ASEAN tourists using this free entry.”

She added that by weaving science, culture, and innovation together, communities can build pathways that turn insights into action and action into lasting impact.

CHED Chairperson Dr. Shirley C. Agrupis delivered the keynote address, urging the academic community toward unity and shared purpose. “Development is not only about progress and productivity but also celebrating our heritage, strengthening community bonds, and illuminating stories that define who we are as a people,” she said.

The opening day continued with plenary sessions featuring three key topics: “Artificial Intelligence and Human Intelligence” by Rev. Fr. Ranhilio C. Aquino, SJD, Ph.D., Dean of the Graduate School of Law at San Beda University; “Philippine Medical Cannabis: Legal Shifts, Scientific Evidence, and Today’s Landscape” by Inv. Richard Nixon Gomez, CNP, President of BauerTek Pharmaceutical Technologies Philippines;

“Herbal Innovations for Global Wellness: A Sustainable Cultural Heritage Approach” by Dr. Rosnani Hasham, Director of the Institute of Bioproduct Development at Universiti Teknologi Malaysia.

The 2025 Nexus Summit continues until December 4 featuring four breakout sessions: Life Sciences, Agriculture, Fisheries, and Food; Applied Sciences, Engineering, and Technology; Teacher Education and Human Kinetics; and Future Thinking towards Sustainable Development.

In addition, participants will join campus visits and cultural immersions in various CSU campuses, including Carig’s innovation centers—EMRDC, MEIC, and FIC; Piat’s dairy processing and production center; Lallo’s coffee plantation and processing center alongside the LGU Lallo Citronella Project; Gonzaga’s Bamboo Sanctuary and MABRIC Center; and Buguey Extension campus’ Crab Hatchery.





# CSU HOSTS CV-ACE LEADERSHIP FORUM AMID TYPHOON PAOLO



**D**espite Signal No. 2 warnings brought by Typhoon Paolo, regional directors, career executives, CES eligibles, and aspirants from across the region gathered at Cagayan State University (CSU) Claude Andrews Convention Center for the Leadership Forum of the Cagayan Valley Association of Career Executives (CV-ACE).

With over 142 participants, the forum sought to strengthen leadership and promote inter-agency collaboration among regional executives, consistent with the government's thrust to advance the Whole-of-

## CSU ALUMNI AND PERSONNEL GROUPS TURN OVER ₱266,000 IN DONATIONS FOR CALAYAN EXTENSION CAMPUS

**V**arious alumni and personnel groups of Cagayan State University (CSU) turned over on October 3, a total of ₱266,000 in donations to CEO Rodel Francisco Alegado in support of the Calayan Extension Campus, one of the hardest hit by Typhoon Nando when it made landfall on September 23. The typhoon left campus facilities and surrounding communities in urgent need of assistance.

The donations came from different sectors of the CSU community, including Federated Alumni Associations of CSU, led by President and BOR

Member Atty. Carmelo Villacete – ₱100,000, Andrews Campus Alumni Association, headed by Dr. Nestor Ave – ₱20,000, CSU Administrative Personnel Association (APA), led by Ms. Monaliza Guzman – ₱36,000, Carig Alumni Association, led by Engr. Audy Quebral – ₱100,000, and Gonzaga Alumni Association, headed by Dr. Louie Sunico – ₱10,000 contribution included in the collective donation.

In addition, the Andrews Campus Alumni Association also extended ₱20,000 in aid to Barangay Babuyan Claro, one of the most severely devastated barangays in Calayan Island. 🙌





# CSU CONDUCTS TRAINING-WORKSHOP ON PEDAGOGY, ASSESSMENT METHODS, AND TEST CONSTRUCTION IN OBE FRAMEWORK

To strengthen faculty competence in Outcome-Based Education (OBE), Cagayan State University conducted a Two-Day Training-Workshop on Pedagogy, Assessment Methods, and Test Construction in the OBE Framework on October 2–3, 2025.

The activity aimed to equip non-education graduates and new faculty members with essential knowledge and practical skills in teaching, assessment, and test construction aligned with OBE principles.

On the first day, Dr. Princess Zarla Raguindin and Dr. Alvin B. Barcelona of the

Philippine Normal University facilitated sessions on the Basic Concepts and Principles of Assessment and the Table of Specifications, and led workshops on test construction and processing of outputs.

The second day featured lectures on Scoring Rubrics, Constructive Alignment as the Core of OBE, and Student-Centered Pedagogies, led by Dr. Raguindin and Dr. Ferdinand B. Bulusan of Isabela State University. Participants actively engaged in workshops that applied the concepts discussed.

The training-workshop successfully enhanced the participants' capability to design outcome-based

assessments and adopt student-centered teaching approaches, contributing to the continuous improvement of instruction and learning outcomes at CSU.

The activity was a joint

initiative of the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, headed by Dr. Mariden V. Cauilan, and the Office of the Director of Instruction, led by Dr. Lirio Gudina C. Mangawil. 🇵🇭

Likewise, CSU was commended for being the Top 6 Performing School in the September 2025 Librarians Computer-Based Licensure Examination.

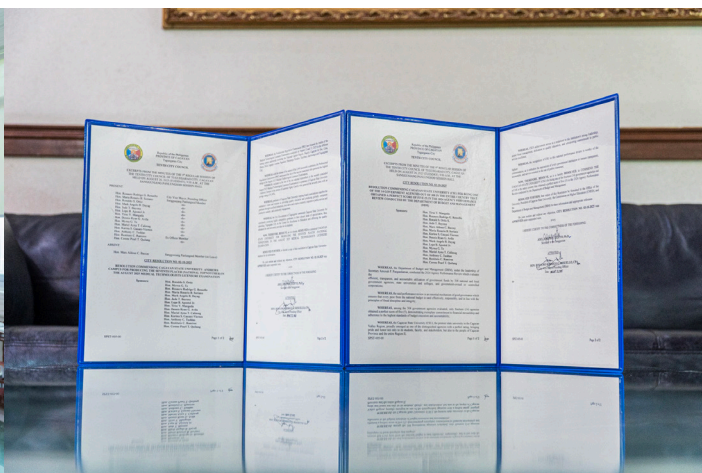
The resolution recognized the exemplary performance of CSU

The review assessed transparency, efficiency, and fiscal discipline in government institutions, recognizing CSU's sound financial management and adherence to the highest standards of accountability and good governance. 🇵🇭

offices will inspire continued excellence and growth. "This marks not just the renewal of our physical space but also a fresh beginning for our college," she said.

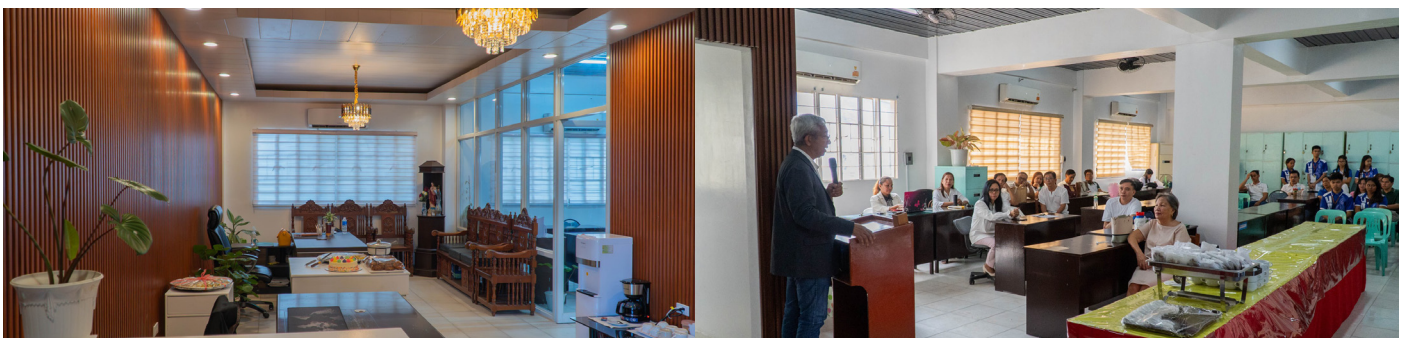

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# CSU SECURES IMPROVED PBB 2023 FINAL SCORE FOLLOWING AO25 IATF DECISION; EMPLOYEES TO GET 6.5% ADDITIONAL PAY

The Inter-Agency Task Force on the Harmonization of National Government Performance Monitoring, Information, and Reporting Systems (IATF-HNGPMIRS) has approved Cagayan State University's (CSU) appeal regarding its final eligibility assessment for the 2023 Performance-Based Bonus (PBB) cycle.

In a letter, Budget and Management Assistant Secretary Leonido J. Pulido III, chair of the AO 25 – IATF Technical Working Group, informed CSU Officer-In-Charge Dr. Arthur G. Ibanez that, after revalidation and reassessment by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and the Anti-Red Tape Authority (ARTA), the university's score was improved.

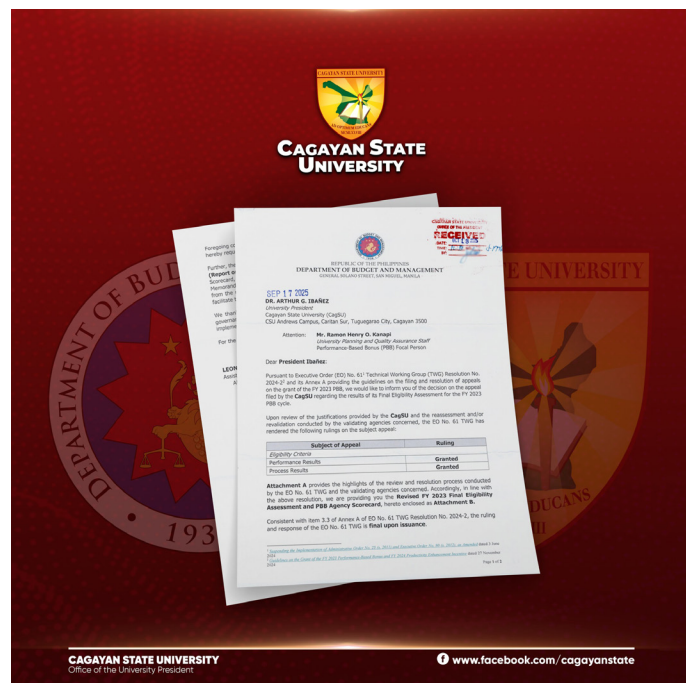
As a result, CSU's total points increased from 70 to 80, earning an additional 10 points. Under the PBB 2023 guidelines, an institution with 80 points is eligible for a bonus equivalent to 52% of its employees' monthly basic salary.

Initially, CSU was approved in January to release funds for 45.5% of employees' basic salaries, based on a 70-point score. With this latest development, employees now have the opportunity to receive an additional 6.5%, reflecting the higher score.

To qualify for the PBB, institutions must score at least 70 out of 100 points and achieve a rating of 4 or higher in at least three of the four accountability dimensions, according to the PBB Scoring System.

## CSU OIC PRESIDENT IBÁÑEZ JOINS SUCs IN STRENGTHENING AGRI-AQUA INNOVATION THROUGH RAISE COMMITMENT

Cagayan State University (CSU) OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez joined other State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) in the region for the signing of the Regional Agri-Aqua Innovation System Enhancement (RAISE) Wall of Commitment during the opening program of the RAISE Summit Week on October 13, 2025, at Hotel Casiana, Tagaytay City,

Cavite.

The activity is part of the DOST-PCAARRD National RAISE Program, which brings together 94 State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and Research and Development Institutes (RDIs) from 15 regions across the country.

Anchored on the theme "Building Bridges through ALIGNment, CONNECTION, and SYNChronization for Agri-Aqua Innovation," the summit provides a venue for

knowledge sharing, policy discussions, and collaborative solution-building in the agriculture and aquaculture sectors.

The week-long summit features interactive sessions, exhibits, and innovation showcases designed to accelerate science-based innovations, promote community-led practices, and strengthen partnerships for inclusive and sustainable development in the agri-aqua

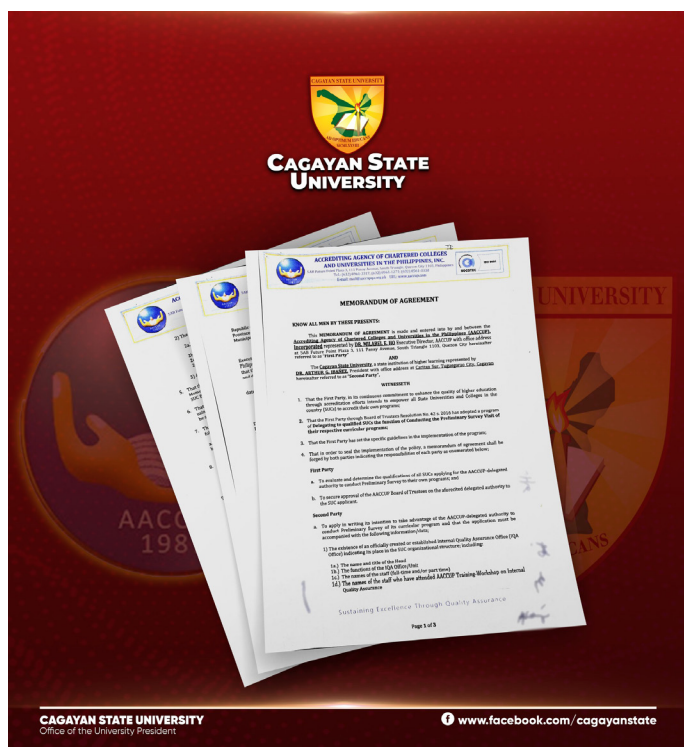
value chain.

# CSU INKS AGREEMENT WITH AACCCUP TO CONDUCT INTERNAL ACCREDITATION SURVEYS



Cagayan State University (CSU), represented by OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez, has entered into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCCUP), Incorporated, represented by Executive Director Dr. Milabel E. Ho, authorizing the University to conduct its own Preliminary Survey Visits for academic program accreditation.

Anchored on AACCCUP Board of Trustees Resolution No. 42, series of 2016, the initiative delegates to qualified State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) the authority to conduct preliminary surveys as part of efforts to strengthen internal quality assurance systems and build institutional

capacity for sustainable quality development.

As part of the agreement, CSU will maintain a fully established Internal Quality Assurance (IQA) Office responsible for managing accreditation processes, training internal accreditors, and ensuring compliance with national quality standards.

The University will also adopt AACCCUP's official instruments, rating system, and reporting formats in its internal evaluations.

Results of CSU's internal Preliminary Surveys will be reviewed and validated by AACCCUP for approval and conferment of Candidate Status, and subsequently endorsed to the National Network of Quality Assurance Agencies (NNQAA) for certification.

## 20 CSU FACULTY AND STUDENTS COMPLETE PDOS, RECEIVE TRAVEL AUTHORITY FOR MALAYSIA CULTURAL EXCHANGE PROGRAM



Twenty faculty members and students from Cagayan State University have successfully completed the Pre-Departure Orientation Seminar and were subsequently issued their Authority to Travel on October 17, 2025, as part of their preparation for the UiTM Cultural Exchange Program in Malaysia.

Conducted by the

Office of the Vice President for Internationalization, Partnership and Resource Mobilization, the PDOS oriented delegates on safety and security measures, cultural and social adaptation, UiTM policies, the CSU Code of Conduct Abroad and legal and risk management guidelines. Participants also accomplished and submitted all required travel documents

as part of the University's compliance and due diligence process.

The Authority to Travel, signed by OIC University President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez, formally endorses the participation of the CSU delegation in the international program, affirming the University's commitment to student and faculty mobility under its internationalization

framework.

Through programs like this, CSU continues to strengthen its internationalization efforts in support of the ACHIEVE Agenda of CHED Chairperson Dr. Shirley C. Agrupis, reaffirming the University's commitment to internationalization through faculty and student mobility.



# CSU HOLDS CONSULTATION ON LOCALIZING SDGs WITH PARTNERS, STAKEHOLDERS

Cagayan State University (CSU) conducted a consultation session with its adopted communities, civil society

organizations, local government units, and other stakeholders on October 13, 2025, via Zoom, as part of its continuing efforts to localize the United Nations

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

In his message, OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez acknowledged Dr. Gigid T. Battung, Dean of the College of Business, Entrepreneurship, and Accountancy, for her significant role in CSU's inclusion in the United Nations Localization Network.

Dr. Ibañez highlighted that the consultation serves as an important step in defining the university's path toward sustainable local action, emphasizing that the "experiences, challenges, and solutions will help define what local climate action and social development truly mean in our community."

Meanwhile, Dr. Battung explained that CSU's participation in the UN Localization Network opens opportunities for the

The said initiative aligns with two upcoming international events, the World Summit for Social Development in Doha, Qatar, and the 30th UN Climate Change Conference (COP30) in Belém, Brazil, where CSU will present its sustainability programs rooted in local partnerships and community-driven initiatives.

Blessed earlier today, the first floor of the CSU-Andrews Campus Student Center is now open for use, offering students a conducive space for learning, academic

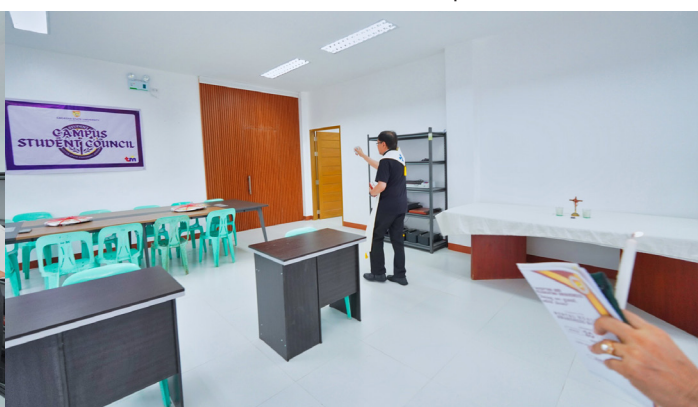
collaboration, and co-curricular engagement.

# CSU PARTNERS WITH DOST, TESDA IX TO POWER SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT IN ZAMBOANGA DEL NORTE



**T**uguegarao City — Cagayan State University (CSU) has forged a tripartite partnership with the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) Region IX and the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) Region IX for the establishment of the country's first C-Trike Kit Developer and Training Center in Zamboanga del Norte.

Through its Electromobility Research and Development Center (eMRDC), CSU developed a specialized conversion kit that transforms conventional tricycles into electric-powered C-Trikes, specifically designed for the tricycle models of Zamboanga del

Norte.

This innovation, part of the project "FASTRAC Lite: Development and Validation of the Improved Cost-effective Electric Kits for the Conversion of Conventional Tricycle to eTrike," will now be expanded through the creation of the Zamboanga del Norte Training Center, CSU's first satellite hub outside Region II dedicated to C-Trike fabrication, assembly, and training.

Under the agreement, CSU serves as the technology generator of the patented C-Trike conversion kit, while TESDA Region IX will act as the licensee, responsible for developing and training local fabricators and installers. DOST Region IX will function as the facilitating partner,

providing technical support, monitoring, and promotion of the technology across the Zamboanga Peninsula.

TESDA IX Acting Regional Director Engr. Alan C. Bacatan described the partnership as "a significant milestone not only for Zamboanga del Norte but for the entire Zamboanga Peninsula," highlighting the establishment of the center at the Dipolog School of Fisheries as a symbol of innovation, sustainability, and collaboration.

Meanwhile, DOST IX OIC Regional Director Jennifer A. Pidor lauded CSU's dedication to practical technology development, calling the initiative "a livelihood boost, a climate action, and a proof of

concept rolled into one."

The Memorandum of Agreement was signed today, October 22, 2025, by CSU OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez, DOST IX OIC Regional Director Jennifer A. Pidor, and TESDA IX Acting Regional Director Engr. Alan C. Bacatan. Witnessing the event were CSU Vice Presidents Dr. Mariden V. Cauilan and Dr. Ana Marie C. Cauilan, University Technical Advisers Dr. Florentina S. Dumlao and Dr. Urdujah G. Alvarado (also a member of the CSU Board of Regents), along with DOST II Regional Director Dr. Virginia G. Bilgera and TESDA II Assistant Regional Director Genero Ronald C. Ibay.

## CSU HOLDS "LAKASA" FORUM SHOWCASING INDIGENOUS RESEARCH AND COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

**T**he Cagayan State University, through the Knowledge and Technology Management and Publication Office (KTMP), in collaboration with the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP) Region 02, conducted the "Lakasa" Forum, an online event that highlighted CSU's research and extension efforts dedicated to Indigenous Peoples (IPs) and their cultural heritage.

In his message, OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez highlighted the University's role in championing inclusivity and cultural preservation through education and

research. Director for Extension Dr. Josie Y. Basong and KTMP Director Dr. Gilbert C. Magulod, Jr. likewise emphasized the need to provide a space for indigenous voices, protect their heritage, and use science and technology to support sustainable development in indigenous communities.

The forum featured research presentations on topics such as traditional architectural practices, indigenous music and beliefs, and the use of native medicinal plants. CSU researchers also shared their extension initiatives focused on disaster preparedness, livelihood support, and

digital literacy programs designed to uplift and empower IP communities.

In her closing message, Ms. Danica Ibañez, Research Compliance and Management Specialist, reflected on the meaning of "Lakasa," an Ilocano term

that symbolizes a chest of treasures. "Ang 'lakasa' ay larawan ng yaman ng ating lahi—mga kwento, paniniwala, at karunungan dapat pangalagaan at ipagmalaki," she said, describing how indigenous heritage remains a vital part of the Filipino identity.





# CAGAYAN VALLEY STARTUP WEEK 2025 KICKS OFF AT CSU, HIGHLIGHTS PARTNERSHIP WITH PCCI-CAGAYAN



**T**he Cagayan Valley Startup Week (CVSW) 2025 officially opened on October 27, 2025 at the Cagayan State University–Claude Andrews Convention Center, gathering startups, MSMEs, entrepreneurs, government agencies, academic institutions, LGUs, investors, and development partners across the region.

Organized by the Synergetic, Innovative, and Agile (SINAG) Cagayan Valley Consortium, the three-day event carries the theme “Igniting Collaboration, Mapping Opportunities, and Transforming Cagayan Valley’s Startup Landscape.” It aims to strengthen the regional startup ecosystem through collaboration among the academe, industry, and

To advance its development plan of providing accessible, inclusive, and quality higher education, Cagayan State University (CSU) held an Executive Planning Workshop on November 3, 2025, at Blue Coast Beach Hotel, Sta. Ana, Cagayan.

The workshop focused on key institutional initiatives aimed at expanding educational access and enhancing academic excellence, notably the proposal to establish the Calayan and Buguey Extension Sites as independent campuses and

the grant of fiscal stability to CSU Solana.

OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibanez led the discussions, joined by CSU Board of Regents Member Dr. Urdujah G. Alvarado, University Advisers Fr. Ranhilio C. Aquino, and Dr. Florentina S. Dumlao, along with university vice presidents, campus executive officers, the university planning director, and campus planning officers.

Fr. Ranhilio C. Aquino, presented the legal considerations involved in converting Calayan and

Buguey into full-fledged campuses. On the other hand, VP for Academic Affairs Dr. Mariden V. Cavilan, together with CEOs Dr. Rodel Francisco T. Alegado and Dr. Audy R. Quebral, discussed the academic considerations of the proposed conversion to ensure the continued delivery of relevant and quality instruction.

Administrative aspects were also tackled by Dr. Urdujah G. Alvarado, VP for Administration and Finance Dr. Theresa B. Dimalanta, and University Technical Adviser Dr. Florentina S. Dumlao, who emphasized

the importance of efficient governance, sustainable resource management, and institutional alignment with CSU's strategic vision for the next 10 years of operation.

Currently, the Calayan and Buguey sites operate as extensions of CSU Sanchez Mira and CSU Aparri, respectively. Their conversion into a financially stable campuses is envisioned to bring higher education opportunities closer to underserved communities, particularly in geographically isolated areas of Cagayan. 🇵🇭

## DOST-PCAARRD, CSU INK MOA FOR S&T-BASED MANGO PRODUCTION AND PROCESSING PROJECT IN CAGAYAN

The Department of Science and Technology–Philippine Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development (DOST-PCAARRD) and Cagayan State University (CSU) formalized a partnership through a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for the implementation of the project “S&T Community-Based Farm on Mango Production and Processing for Enterprise Development in Cagayan Province.”

The two-year project, to be carried out from October 1, 2025 to September 30, 2027, aims to improve the income and enterprise sustainability of the Illuru Sur Malaueg Mango Growers and Workers Association

(ISMMGWA) in Rizal, Cagayan through S&T-based interventions in mango production, postharvest handling, value-adding, and market linkage development.

The project targets to enhance the capacities of ISMMGWA members, rehabilitate mango orchards using S&T-based approaches, develop a commercial-scale mango fruit bar, a CSU funded research product, and establish market linkages with at least two institutional buyers or processors.

The initiative is also expected to provide a sustainable mango supply in the province, strengthen technical competencies among growers, and improve the economic condition of the mango

growers' association while contributing to national efforts toward mango self-sufficiency.

The agreement was signed by DOST-PCAARRD Executive Director Dr. Reynaldo V. Ebor and CSU Officer-in-Charge, Office of the University President, Dr.

Arthur G. Ibañez, following the project's approval by the PCAARRD Directors' Council on September 16, 2025. CSU–Piat will serve as the implementing unit, with Mr. Macluvén Gonzales as project leader, while DOST-PCAARRD will provide ₱5 million in funding support. 🇵🇭

Educational Management, English, Social Studies, and Technology Educational Management, as well as the Bachelor of Technical-Vocational Teacher Education, Bachelor of Elementary Education, and Bachelor of Secondary Education programs majoring in English, Mathematics, and Social Studies.

"We view this as an opportunity to grow and improve, as continuous development is essential to maintaining excellence in higher education," said OIC President Dr. Arthur G. Ibañez during the opening

program of the survey visits. "This year, about 45 of our academic programs underwent accreditation, and the final campus, CSU Aparri, will host the last third survey visit," he added.

The survey visits, scheduled to run until November 28, provide the university a platform to showcase its strengths while identifying areas for improvement.

Earlier, from November 12 - 14, CSU Sanchez Mira, CSU Lasam, and CSU Lal-lo simultaneously participated in AACUP Level III Phase II online accreditation

evaluations.

CSU Sanchez Mira presented its Bachelor of Science in Accounting Information Systems (BSAIS), Bachelor of Science in Agriculture (BSA), and Bachelor of Science in Information Technology (BSIT) programs for evaluation. CSU Lasam had its BS Information Technology (BSIT) and BS Industrial Technology (BSIndTech) programs reviewed, while CSU Lal-lo presented its Bachelor of Elementary Education (BEED) program.

Meanwhile, Campus Executive Officer Atty. Carla

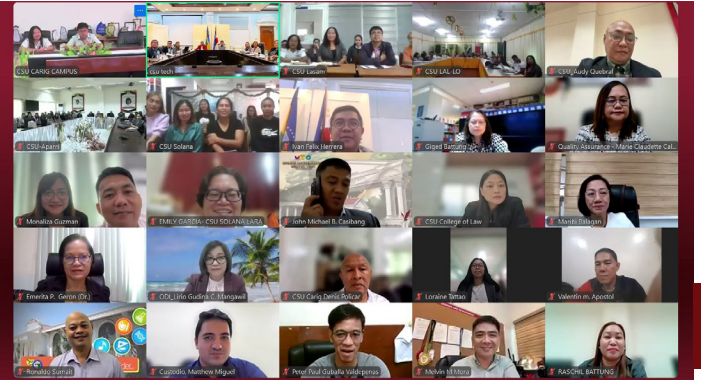

## CSU, DENR-RO2 SIGN MOA FOR APARRI MARINE SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH STATION



**C**agayan State University (CSU) entered into a Memorandum of Agreement with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources Regional Office II (DENR-RO2) on December 16, 2025, to jointly implement the Marine Scientific Research Station (MSRS) Program in Aparri, Cagayan.

The agreement was signed by CSU Officer-in-Charge University President Arthur G. Ibañez and DENR-RO2 Executive Director Dr. Gwendolyn C. Bambalan,

institutionalizing cooperation between the academe and government in support of marine science, research, and conservation.

Pursuant to the MOA, CSU will collaborate with DENR-RO2 in crafting a comprehensive MSRS research agenda aligned with national development priorities and international environmental commitments. The University will also contribute academic oversight in facility development and lead capability-building, training, and outreach programs.

The establishment of the MSRS strengthens DENR-RO2's regional marine protection initiatives while expanding CSU's research and extension footprint in coastal governance, sustainability, and innovation.

The signing was witnessed by Dr. Audy R. Quebral, Executive Officer of CSU-Aparri Campus, and Mr. Enrique Q. Passion, OIC Assistant Regional Director for Technical Services of DENR-RO2.

Strategically located

along the northern Philippine Sea, the Aparri MSRS will serve as a hub for marine and coastal research, climate monitoring, and community collaboration. It will generate scientific data to support marine conservation, habitat restoration, and sustainable resource management, particularly in addressing climate-related risks. The facility will also function as a shared learning space with laboratories and training areas for scientists, local governments, and coastal communities. 🌊

OIC President Arthur G. Ibañez and CHED

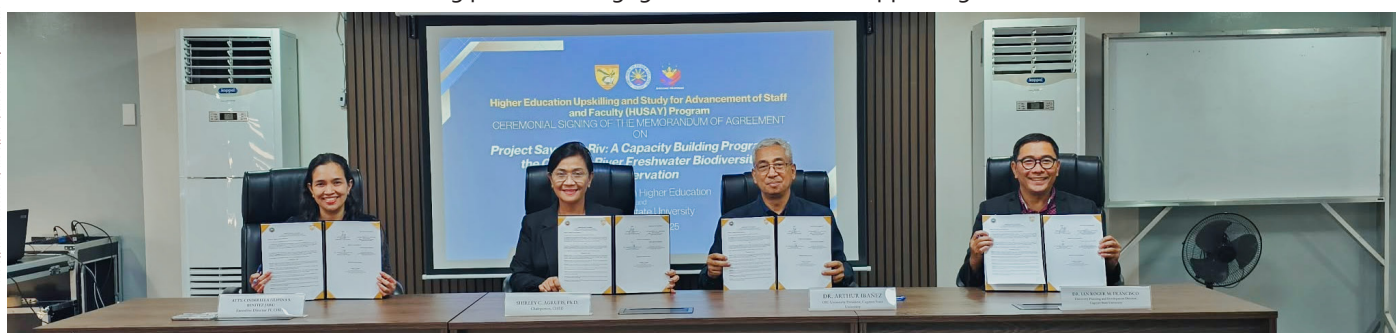
